The most enjoyable part of volunteering for the WAC Raku booth is meeting the people, their excitement choosing what piece to paint, what colors, watching the hot kiln unloading.

Glaze HIGHLIGHTS

CONE 10 GLAZING IDEAS

Glaze-Clay Interactions

Before thinking about what you want the glazes on your piece to look like, think about your clay! At the high temperatures of a cone 10 kiln, glazes and clay bodies interact, meaning that the same glaze on different clay types can yield very different results.

Chun White, for example, interacts with iron particles in the WAC's Speckled Mix clay to produce brown speckles. On clay bodies like G-mix or porcelain, the same glaze is solid white. Reitz Green is another example: on light-colored clay bodies like G-mix or porcelain, this glaze is a medium green with occasional brown flecks, but on darker clays like Dakota Red or DRSM, it can turn nearly black, with a metallic sheen.

The Beauty of Celadons

Do you have a piece with delicate textures or edges that you'd like to show off? Consider a celadon glaze! Celadons are translucent and shiny, and accentuate the fine details of stamps and other textures beautifully. They are simple and elegant, and can therefore draw attention to the form of a delicately shaped piece.

The WAC now offers Celadon glazes with more colors than ever before, including green, blue, red and yellow.

Surprising Glaze Combinations

Only in the magical world of glazing could white and black make blue, but that's exactly what happens when a coat of Chun White is applied

over Black by Popular Demand! The plates below were created by dipping each plate in Black by Popular Demand, painting leaf shapes on in wax, and dipping them again in Chun White.

If you feel like a glazing adventure, try combining Amber Celadon and Lavender! Gold speckles are often involved. This mug was first dipped in Amber Celadon, then in Lavender.


What else would you like to share about Luke?

Classes & WORKSHOPS



WAC GENERAL *Safety Tips*

- 1 Always use a mask and/or gloves when exposed to ceramic material in excess or over long periods of time. (liquid or dry clay, glaze or oxide).
- 2 Sand greenware pottery outside. Another option is to use the spray booth which is ventilated. Clean-up is a lot easier.
- 3 If you have a piece that needs extensive grinding, put it on the marked shelf and the staff will grind it.
- 4 When mixing glazes, use the whisks provided. Using bare hands is hazardous to your health.
- 5 Put Glaze bucket lids on the correct glaze to avoid glaze contamination.
- 6 When cleaning up your potter's wheel make sure it is turned off. Accidental pressing of the foot pedal can be dangerous while cleaning up.
- 7 Make sure your wheel is turned off and the foot pedal is in the off position before you leave it. The next person to use the wheel may turn the wheel on and the bat or pot might tip or fly off.
- 8 In the case of mopping or water spills, place the yellow safety sign in the wet area until cleaned up and dry.
- 9 All pottery must be totally dry before being bisque fired.
- 10 All pottery must be bisque fired before being glazed and glaze fired. An exception would be applying underglaze to green ware.

OUR Mission

The Willamette Art Center encourages lifelong learning and exploration of the arts, vital ingredients for the health of individuals and communities.

The Willamette Art Center (WAC), Salem/Keizer's only community ceramic arts center since 2005, is located at the Oregon State Fairgrounds. The WAC operates as the public face of Friends of the Visual Arts—a non-profit 501(c)3 organization dedicated to improving our community through art educational and community enrichment. One full-time and five part-time staff, a nine-member Board of Directors, 30 permanent volunteers and many part-time volunteers work an average of 1780 hours per year to operate the Center. The membership of this organization is open to all staff, students, artists, and the public at large. Our patrons represent a cross section of the Mid-Willamette Valley in age, occupation, income, and ethnicity. The Center is a culturally diverse community.

We are a non-profit organization, thriving, and proud of our accomplishments!

We seek your donations to maintain, improve and expand our facility and programs:

- New wheels are needed to equip our former gallery so that it can be used for additional classes and open studio. Our 14 class offerings fill very quickly, sometimes in an hour. We have a long waiting list of patrons each term, hoping to take classes.
- Support our Scholarship fund, which allows community members in need to take classes.
 - Support ongoing repairs, upgrades, and maintenance of kilns.
 - Offset increased shipping costs on our large, bulk clay and other supply orders.
 - Sponsor individual schools requesting to be part of our Artists in the Schools program.

OUR Challenges

- The Center was closed for a few months during the Covid shutdown, but we were able to re-open following state health guidelines. Responsible fiscal management, and the strong support of staff and patrons made this possible.
- We recently replaced the Center's roof for our patrons' safety.

OUR Accomplishments

- We donated the proceeds from our annual Empty Bowls Fundraiser (\$20,000) to the Marion Polk Food Share to help feed the hungry in our community. We sold over 1,500 WAC handmade pottery pieces in one evening and one day.
- Local students of all ages create with clay under our instructors' guidance, in and out of the studio.
- Our classes are going strong!
